SPARK: Lisa Kahn's eye-catching vision board

JD: Tell us about your vision board? LK: I have a vision board because it is a

place I capture things that inspire me and speak to my imagination. It's a mixture of everything: quotes, watercolors I've painted, phases of the moon, things my kids made when they were little, photographs, cards I've received, malas, sacred geometry diagrams — if it interests me, I pin it up I also use it to remind me of what is important to me. It's a meaningful tool in my sanctuary lab at home and in my design studio.



JD: How do you determine what goes up on it? **LK:** It's anything that catches my eye and my imagination. It doesn't have to be

on paper — I include beads, tassels, ornaments. I like my board to have some 3D elements. JD: How often does it change?

LK: I add things to it all the time and a couple of times I year I give it a purge

and take down things that don't seem as interesting to me anymore. JD: Do you ever completely empty it?

LK: The only time I emptied it was when I moved. I have taken down sections of it to pin up specific things for a project I want to look at with a fresh

perspective — seeing it up on the wall, as I work and do other things, lets me think about that project and roll it around in my mind. I think about it peripherally and many times out of that experience comes my most inspired ideas. Creativity in design can a fickle muse and I find that sometimes she appreciates not being stared directly in the eye.

JD: Are you the kind of person who needs visual cues daily?

LK: Decidedly yes. It feeds part of my brain and part of my spirit.
